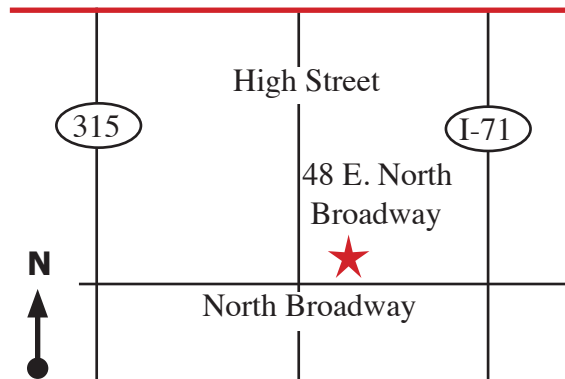

Beyond Good Intentions: The Role White People Must Play in the Work of Racial Justice

In our nation we now are witnessing an alarming resurgence of white supremacy and state-sanctioned violence in the brutal murders of people of color across the country. It is also a time pregnant with hope as a new generation of leadership is rising to meet the challenges, and as movements like Black Lives Matter demand an end to police brutality, staggering unemployment, and the school-to-prison pipeline.

In this kairos time, rife with pain and promise, it's imperative that white people do the deep work required to claim an anti-racist identity, understand the privilege they carry, and interrupt racism where they live, work, and worship. Sadly, too many white people stop short of that deep work, assuming that good intentions are enough.

Dr. Morrison's lecture will address how white people can and must move through places where they often get stuck — denial, guilt, shame, and fear — so they can step up with courage, humility, and compassion to participate in movements led by people of color and help move other white people to greater anti-racist awareness and action.

ABOUT THE LECTURER

Melanie S. Morrison, Ph.D., is founder and Executive Director of Allies for Change (www.alliesforchange.org). She is a seasoned social justice educator, activist, pastor and author with 25 years experience designing and facilitating transformational group process. Dr. Morrison has provided anti-racism training and consultation for a wide variety of educational and non-profit organizations including Michigan State University's College of Education, Yale Divinity School, and Hunter College School of Social Work. She served as consultant to the United Church of Christ's Sacred Conversation on Race, a national initiative launched in April 2008. In 1994, she co-founded Doing Our Own Work, an intensive anti-racism program for white people that has attracted participants from communities all across North America.

Dr. Morrison has a Masters of Divinity from Yale Divinity School and a Ph.D. in theology from the University of Groningen in The Netherlands. She is the author of *The Grace of Coming Home: Sexuality, Spirituality, and the Struggle for Justice* and numerous journal articles. Ordained in the United Church of Christ, she has pastored three congregations; two in Michigan and one in the Netherlands. She has also served as adjunct faculty at Chicago Theological Seminary. She lives in Okemos, Michigan with her life partner, April Allison.

Dr. Morrison believes it is possible to grow ever more aware of the depth and complexity of injustice without surrendering our capacity for compassion, joy, and hope.
